Instructions to Authors [2014]

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SCOPE

The Indian Journal of Geo Marine Sciences, issued monthly, is devoted to the publication of communications relating to various facets of research in (i) Marine sciences including marine engineering and marine pollution; (ii) Climate change & (iii) Geosciences i.e. geology, geography and geophysics. IJMS is a multidisciplinary journal in marine sciences and geosciences. Therefore, research and review papers and book reviews of general significance to marine sciences and geosciences which are written clearly and well organized will be given preference.

NATURE OF MANUSCRIPT

General articles, review articles, opinions, correspondences, research articles, research news, news, meeting reports, historical commentaries and historical comments/notes and book reviews are the categories of manuscripts to be submitted to IJMS.

General articles [about 5000 words, very essential figures, tables, display items] discuss current trends in research in marine sciences and geosciences that would be of interest to readers outside the field. The articles should include an abstract, introductory paragraph, brief subheads at appropriate places, illustrations that will help a general reader and references.

Review articles [not exceeding 5000 words] survey and discuss the current developments in field related to marine sciences and geosciences.

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Illustrations and photographs are welcome.

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Title: The title should be such as to be useful in indexing and information retrieval. If a paper forms part of a series, a subtitle indicating the aspects of the work covered in the paper should be provided. If the title is long, a short title suitable for use as running title should be supplied.

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Introduction: The introductory part should bear no heading, be brief and state precisely the scope of the paper. Reviewing of the literature should not exceed what is necessary to indicate the reason for the research undertaken and the essential background.

Materials and Methods: The nomenclature, the source of materials and the procedures should be clearly stated to enable other workers to repeat the work, if necessary. New methods should be described in sufficient detail, but if the methods are already well recognized, a mere reference to them will do; deviation, if any, should, however, be given.

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Conclusion: The conclusion should be limited to 100 words, highlighting the principal findings and results. It should explain the significance of the results.

Acknowledgement: Acknowledgements should be brief and for specific assistance only.

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
